Reading Center Satellite Office Now Open in Woodbury

One of our Strategic Goals is to significantly increase the reach of The Reading Center, so that more students receive help. We have decided to expand our reach both in Rochester (SEMN) and in the Twin Cities. The Twin Cities is very under resourced for providing dyslexic people testing and OG tutoring. Toward this end, we opened a satellite Reading Center in

Woodbury, MN this summer. In this space our staff have already been providing dyslexia testing, Reading Readiness screenings and professional development for our Twin Cities based Partnership Tutors. As word spreads about our greater accessibility for the Twin Cities, in-person OG tutoring will occur in the satellite, as well as outreach efforts.

We will celebrate this milestone with a Grand Opening at The Reading Center Woodbury Satellite on October 17, from 5 - 7 p.m. We look forward to seeing many of you at the Grand Opening.

There are changes and exciting developments at The Reading Center that I would like to share with you.

Barbara Zelinske, our talented and effective Director of Teacher Training is soon to retire from her role at The Reading Center. As a Fellow of the OG Academy, Barbara has been instrumental in ensuring that our Orton-Gillingham (OG) training program graduates well-trained adults, ready to teach dyslexic students to read using the OG approach. During her tenure, she developed and taught a training course for classroom teachers called OG Infusion, from

2007-2017. She designed and implemented our online Basic and Advanced Orton-Gillingham Institute training courses as well, making our rigorous training more accessible, yet maintaining its strong outcomes. October is Dyslexia Awareness month and The Reading Center marks the month with outreach opportunities. This year, a film called "Right to Read" was released, and it very well communicates literacy issues that especially impact children of color, with a focus on Science of Reading based solutions. We are proud to be partnering with the Rochester NAACP and Mayo Clinic's African Descendants employee group to show this film on **October 26** at 125 Live in Rochester, MN.

Finally, this summer we had the privilege of the services of Jack Bieber as a Data Analysis Intern. I'll leave you with this encouraging factoid: First-year students at The Reading Center more than doubled their single word reading skills over the course of one year. 76% of these students gained two or more grade equivalencies in one year! Director of Teacher Training, Barbara Zelinske, Retires This Fall

Barbara Zelinske has been a central figure at The Reading Center for almost 30 years. Like many Reading Center tutors, Barb was the parent of a struggling student who, despite being a licensed teacher, did not know how to teach her child to read. She found her answers at The Reading Center when she met founder Jean Osman.

Barb started tutoring for TRC in 1995. She earned the distinction of Fellow of the Orton-Gillingham Academy in 2013. But her seminal legacy will be in the role Director of Teacher Training, having directed our Orton-Gillingham Training Institutes since 2007. Barb grew our Academy of Orton-Gillingham

Barb says, "What a privilege it has been to work for such a vibrant and life-changing organization. Historic Reading Legislation Passes in Minnesota!

The Reading Center and other literacy allies worked to gain passage of the READ Act this past legislative session. The READ Act does the following:

- New state literacy goal: every child reading at grade level, every year from K-12
- Mandated teacher training in Science of Reading - courses approved by MN Department of Education (MDE)
- Mandated screening and progress monitoring - tool approved by MDE
- Districts must use evidencebased curriculum
- Money available to districts to purchase evidence-based curriculum from approved MDE list

These changes are monumental and represent a true shift in how



our state approaches reading instruction. It will take some time for educators to be trained in evidence-based practices, and

truly make the shift away from balanced literacy.

The Reading Center's long-time motto, "Literacy for All," is becoming a motto across the state for this literacy movement.

As an organization, we have been using the evidence-based approach to reading instruction for 72 years. We know how impactful this approach is for dyslexic students. Now, more students will receive this type of instruction in their own classrooms. Congratulations Minnesota!

Hannah reflects that her elementary years were "super frustrating" academically and her parents found she needed outside help. In 3rd grade Hannah began tutoring with The Reading Center which she describes as a "turning point in my life". She says having dyslexia has taught her to "never give up no matter what or how big a challenge seemed," and that having a learning disability "makes me who I am."

The Pat Lund Scholarship

Patrick "Pat" Lund (1963-2022) was a Reading Center alumnus who was a thirtyyear fixture in the Southeastern MN sports reporting field. Most of his career was spent at KTTC-TV in Rochester. He had a legacy of mentoring younger television journalists and

photojournalists and was the second inductee into the Tight End Hall of Fame in 2021. Despite being held back in 1st grade and struggling through high school and college, Pat persevered and worked in his dream career as a sports reporter. Pat didn't let his dyslexia stop him from achieving his goals.

The Lund family is celebrating Pat by helping others with dyslexia to reach their goals. The Lund family, in partnership with The Reading Center, has created an annual scholarship in his honor to help dyslexic students reach their post-secondary education goals.

This opportunity is annually open to Reading Center alumni up to age 30 who are

currently enrolled or have confirmed plans to continue their education through a university, technical school or other training program. Scholarship awards are for up to \$1,000 per year, will be paid directly to the school and are renewable for up to 4 years if studies are continuing.
